Gundogs, Varieties & BIS – Jean Fairlie (Tasaigid)

Started with Weimaraners in 1978. Have owned/bred Show Champions in Weimaraners and Hungarian Vizsla. Along with a couple of Italian Greyhounds, both RCC winners, there is a total of 32 in the Stud Book. In total, have won 34 CCs and 42RCCs. Owned the first Sh Ch Bitch Weimaraner in Scotland and was the first person in Scotland approved to award CCs in 1986. Judged the Weimaraners with CCs at Crufts and Hungarian Wire-haired Vizsla also at Crufts without CCs before being approved to award CCs. I've also judged the Weimaraner and Hungarian Vizsla Specialty Shows in Australia.

Terriers - Linda Matthews

I live in the beautiful Welsh hills with my gamekeeper husband and my Sealyham terriers, Spaniels, Labradors, sheep, horses and ponies. I was introduced to Sealyham's as a child, but grew up with Welsh Springers. My Affix is Leomona and I award CC's in Sealyham & Cesky terriers. I owned my first Sealyham in 1991 and started showing seriously, a Cesky terrier soon followed. I look forward to meeting you and your dogs and enjoying your hospitality.

Hounds (Excluding Whippets) - Jane Maxwell (Bardrestan)

I have been involved with dogs for many years and have been lucky enough to live with Borzoi, cocker spaniels, Italian spinoni and wire haired and miniature wire-haired dachshunds. I awarded my first set of challenge certificates in 2012, in Italian spinoni but have serious interests in several breeds, having passed breeds assessments for Beagles, Whippets, Finnish Spitz, Cocker spaniels and Skye Terriers. Utility Group – Jennifer Bledge (Blomendal)

I started breeding and showing Miniature Schnauzers forty years ago and still have 3 minis at home. I was the first person in Scotland to show black mini's. Around 30 years ago I got my first Sealyham terrier and exhibited both breeds for many years, diving from one ring to another. I only show Sealyhams now, with great success, but I still follow the Mini schnauzers with great interest and have a love for both breeds.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The Show will open at 9.00 a.m.
2. Dogs will be received at any time but it is the exhibitors responsibility to ensure that exhibits are available for judging when required.
3. Judging will commence at 09:30a.m.
4. Exhibits may be removed from the Show after their judging has been completed. The Show will close half an hour after all judging has been completed.
5. ENTRY FEES: £4.00 First Entry Per Dog; Each Subsequent Class per Dog £1.00. NFC @ £2.00. CATALOGUE: £3.00 Prepaid with Entries (£4.00 At Show). FREE Catalogue if 3 or more dogs entered. MEMBERSHIP FEES: £2.00 Single; £3.00 Joint.
6. PRIZE MONEY: no prize money will be paid at this show except stakes classes 147 – 150 as detailed in schedule.
7. The Committee reserves to itself the right to refuse entries..
8. Puppies under six calendar months of age on the first day of the Show are not eligible for exhibition.
9. The mating of bitches within the precincts of the Show is forbidden.
10. BEST PUPPY IN SHOW: There is no Best Puppy in Show competition. Special Best Puppy in Show will come from the Special Puppy classes in each group.
11. BEST INSHOW
The dog declared Best in Show is a dog which has competed and has been declared Best of Breed, Best Any Variety Not Separately Classified or Best Any Variety Imported Breed Register.
Shows Judged on the Group System (Definition; Shows judged on the Group System includes classes for breeds within more than one group, as defined in Kennel Club Regulation B(A); and require a judge to declare a best of each group after which the exhibits so declared will compete for the award of Best in Show and Reserve Best in Show.)
Best of Breed: Where a breed is separately classified a Best of Breed may be declared but only from those dogs which have received a first prize in a breed class at the show. Where separate classes are provided for each sex of a breed a Best of each Sex must be declared.
Best of Group: Best of group and subsequent placings must be selected from:-
 - a) The Best of Breed winners in each group
 - b) The Best dog from the Any Variety Not Separately Classified classes in each group or on each day.
 - c) The Best dog from Any Variety Imported Breed Register classes in each Group or on each day.Best in Show: Best in Show must be selected from the Best of Group winners. Reserve Best in Show must be selected from the remaining Group winners following the selection for Best in Show.
12. Exhibits will not be admitted to Best in Show competition after a period of ten minutes has elapsed since the announcement that exhibits are required for judging, unless they have been unavoidably delayed by previous judging not being completed on time, and then only with the special permission of the Show Management.
13. Exhibitors must not pick up dogs by their tails and leads when lifting them nor handle a dog in a manner which causes its feet not touch the ground when on the move. This is not acceptable. Exhibitors should note that such practice would constitute harsh handling and reports of such practice will be referred to the Committee under Kennel Club Show Regulation F11.
14. All exhibitors must be familiar with Kennel Club Regulation F (Annex B) Regulations for the Preparation of Dogs for Exhibition.
15. All dogs resident outside the UK must be issued with a Kennel Club Authority to Compete number before entry to the show/event can be made. All overseas entries without an Authority to Compete number will be returned to the exhibitor/competitor.
16. A DOGS IN VEHICLES ON HOT DAYS Anyone whose dog is entered at a Kennel Club licensed event should take all reasonable steps to ensure the needs of their dog(s) are met, and should not put a dog's health and welfare at risk by any action, default, omission or otherwise. Breach of Kennel Club Regulations in this respect may be referred to the Board for disciplinary action under the Kennel Club Rules and Regulations.
Your dog is vulnerable and at risk during hot weather and the Kennel Club offers the following guidance to help guide you through the do's and don'ts travelling to and whilst at KC licensed events.
When travelling to a show please take a moment to consider whether the route to the show is on a busy holiday route, and leave earlier to avoid increased time in traffic jams. If your vehicle is not air-conditioned seriously consider whether travelling to the show is a good idea at all.
The vehicle should be as fully ventilated as possible, and plenty of stops should be taken, with lots of water available to drink.
Ensure your dog is not sitting in full sunlight. There should be plenty of free flowing air around the dog.
When at the show, never leave your dog in the vehicle.
Keep the dog in the shade – take your own shade for example a large umbrella and always have plenty of water available to drink so your dog stays well hydrated.
Avoid your dog taking part in unnecessary exertion, or from standing in exposed sunlight for extended lengths of time. Remember, if you feel hot your dog is very likely to feel much hotter and dehydrated, and this could lead to dire results. Please look after your dog's welfare.

17. Not for Competition entries will be accepted. Details of each dog so entered must be recorded on the entry form and must be Kennel Club registered.
18. No modifications will be made to the schedule except by permission of the Board of the Kennel Club, which will be followed by advertisement in the Canine press wherever possible.
